The Holloway Tree

Further to the article in the last edition of “Goss” the lovely ladies at Civic Medical provided some information on Dr. Stuart Holloway.

Dr Stuart Holloway arrived in Terang with his wife Sheila and three children in June 1961. He was born and studied in England working there prior to undertaking work in North Rhodesia in 1951 ; residing and practicing there until 1958 . Following this he returned to England for a period prior to his immigration to Australia. Initially Dr Holloway worked at the Terang Clinic but in later years operated from his own surgery in Bolivar Street.

Dr Holloway was well respected and it was not unusual to find a dozen eggs, a box of freshly picked vegetables or a pair of freshly skinned rabbits in his letterbox, labelled simply “Doc”. Dr Holloway would explain to his children that there were many who struggled to pay his account and this was their means of showing appreciation. His work as a surgeon was the most dominant part of his life and something he was passionate about. He provided his medical care with empathy and skill. He considered spending hours in his workshop constructing a temporary prosthesis for someone whose limb he had had been forced to amputate as all part of the service.

Dr Holloways wife Sheila was involved with the Hospital Auxiliary, being president in 1972.

Dr Stuart Holloway’s life came to a sudden and natural end on 5th July 1984 when he quietly passed away at home aged only 63. He is remembered by those who knew him as a quiet and passionate man with unending patience and great professional expertise.

How lovely that we now have the magnificent Holloway Tree dedicated to this wonderful contributor to our health service.

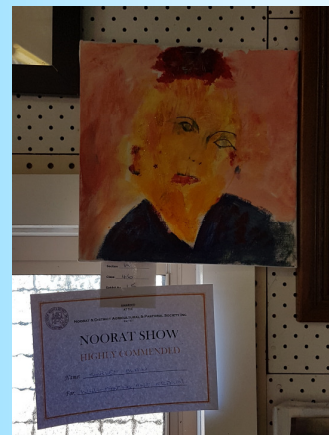

Kitchen Capers

The two “Micks” recently whipped up a selection of rice paper rolls for the Christmas Board Meeting.

They did a fabulous job, and the rolls were extremely popular. TMHS are very lucky to have such competent catering staff. The recipe is below.



Rice Paper Rolls:

Ingredients:

- 12 round rice papers
- 1 Lebanese cucumber , cut into short, thin strips
- 1 small red capsicum, cut into short, thin strips
- 1 large carrot, cut into short, thin strips
- 100 g rice vermicelli or rice noodles
- 1/4 cup mint leaves very finely chopped
- Chopped chicken, duck, prawns

To assemble:

Place all the above apart from the rice paper rolls in a bowl and mix gently

Soak the rice papers (one at a time) in warm water for 30 seconds, rest on a flat surface and place some mixture halfway between the bottom & Centre of the paper, then turn up the bottom of the wrapper to cover the filling. Holding the filling in place, fold in the two sides, then roll up. Repeat.

Serve with Sweet Chilli sauce mixed with a little soy sauce

Australia Day—26th January

Australia Day is the official National Day of Australia. Celebrated annually on **26 January**, it marks the anniversary of the 1788 arrival of the First Fleet of British ships at Port Jackson, New South Wales and the raising of the Flag of Great Britain at Sydney Cove by Governor Arthur Phillip.

In the early 1880s the day was known as 'First Landing', 'Anniversary Day' or 'Foundation Day'. The day often involved re-enactments of the First Fleets arrival. It later became Australia day and was celebrated on the closest Monday to January 26th. Since 1994, the **Australia Day** public holiday has been celebrated on January 26 throughout the country.

Australia Day is about acknowledging and *celebrating* the contribution that every Australian makes to our contemporary and dynamic nation.
